A STUDY OF ST LUKE'S GOSPEL

A Feast of Word of God

- (1) Why is the Word of God different from all other words? Heb 4:12
 - God, Infinitely Immense, created <u>us</u> (Humanity), <u>Adam</u>, as His <u>speaking</u> creation...
 - So, He put Himself in the position of having to communicate to us <u>THROUGH WORDS</u>.
 But, since God is most <u>Pure Spirit</u>, He decided to speak to us through the <u>words of men</u>.
 God chose a series of men (males!) to communicate <u>His Words</u> to us in our own language (<u>human language</u>). <u>Examples:</u> Adam, Abraham, Moses, the Prophets, Evangelists, Saints, Mystics...
 - When we get to the **Church Age** many of the **speakers** are **women**...

Power of the Word: Book of Proverbs: 50 Proverbs on tongue alone

- (a) spoken
- (b) written
- (c) Incarnate Word of God!

<u>Creation:</u> Voyumer Elohim = God <u>said</u>... What He said came into existence... including ourselves

- (2) St Luke the only Gentile Evangelist rehabilitated women in his Gospel.
- (3) Why are there 4 Gospels instead of One?
 - They are 4 <u>Testimonies</u> given to 4 <u>different groups</u> of people living in <u>different areas</u> of the Middle East.
 - Each one wrote from a different perspective.
 - They are given to us not in the order in which they were written but in the order of their

SUBJECT MATTER.

- → They speak about the **Descent of the Word** in Redemption followed by the **Descent of the Spirit** as a result of Redemption.
- → None of them are presented as **BIOGRAPHIES**
- → Only the <u>essentials</u> of the <u>Message</u> are given but from <u>different perspectives</u>.
- (a) **Matthew**: a Jew, wrote to the <u>Jewish</u> World to prove that their long-awaited Messiah had come.
 - Because of this he quoted the Old Testament more than 40 times to prove Jesus was that Messiah.
 - The Theme of his Gospel is "Behold your King!" So the kingly ancestry of Jesus is given at the beginning and He is declared King of the Jews at the end.
- (b) **Mark**: a Jew, writing to a Gentile audience takes a completely different approach.
 - Mark's audience don't know the Old Testament so he **explains** some Jewish customs to them.
 - His Theme is "Behold My Servant". He writes that Jesus is the fulfillment of the 4 Servant Songs of Isaiah.
 - He illustrates Jesus as a **workman** throughout the Gospel.
 - He shows Jesus' sufferings in a very **stark** way to show Christians who were being persecuted and martyred for Christ that He, too, suffered greatly for them...
- (c) Luke: was the only Gentile who wrote a Gospel. His approach was very different to the others.



- He understood <u>Gentile</u> needs... they wanted to see "the Glory of God in Man fully Alive". Luke wrote "<u>Behold the Man</u>"! [or what a Man!] and showed Jesus' Infancy and Passion as Man in his greatness.
 - a lot more later!
- (d) John: The first 3 Gospels were in circulation around the Christian communities for a long time...
 - Towards the end of the first century AD the Bishops of the Church contacted John
 - the last surviving Apostle and they <u>asked</u> him to write a Gospel from a completely <u>supernatural</u> aspect
 - – so John wrote: "Behold your God!" emphasizing the divinity of Christ at a time when the Roman Empire was trying to destroy the Church.

So the 4 Testimonies show the Mystery of Christ from 4 different perspectives:

- (1) **Behold your King**: Jesus fulfills the Scriptures
- (2) Behold my Servant: The lowliness of the Lamb
- (3) **Behold the Man**: The **fact** that **God Himself** showed Himself as a Man is the greatest thing He could say **about Man!**
- (4) Behold your God: "who could believe what we have heard?" Isaiah 53

<u>Let's come to St Luke</u> the man: **<u>who was he</u>**?

- He was a Syrian
- Luke is obviously a shortened form of Lucius or Lucillus, a Latin name.
- He wrote ¼ of the New Testament: Gospel and Acts
- He never became "famous" as we understand that word today.
- He didn't become either <u>a bishop</u> or <u>a martyr!</u>
- He was <u>a doctor</u> a fact which is clear from details he gives in his account of events in Jesus' Ministry.
- He was <u>a celebate</u> and died at <u>84 years of age</u>.
- His great love for humanity comes out in his writings.
- Luke shows great sympathy for <u>women</u> and the role they played in Redemption especially <u>Jesus' Mother</u>.
- There is a Tradition that claims Luke painted the First Portrait of the Blessed Virgin Mary!
- Tradition also claims that he acted as Doctor to <u>BVM</u> in her agony and sufferings...
- Luke also travelled widely with **St Paul** on his missionary journeys
 - that is where we get the **Acts of the Apostles** from!
- Since Luke had such a prominent role in Paul's work, his humility, modesty and hiddenness are remarkable, because he had to have been **very close to BVM** to get the details of the Infancy from her, for example.
- Paul appreciated the enormous dedication of Luke in 2 Tim 4:11 "only Luke is with me" ... after others had moved off...

The "We" passages of Acts → • The "we" passages of Acts 16:10-17; 20:5-15; 21:1-18; 27:1-28:6

• All proved that Luke worked closely with Paul in his Missionary Work

The Language of Luke's Gospel and Acts

- Luke uses <u>easy to read</u> Greek which shows that it was his own language.
- The 3 Jewish Gospels use **KOINE Greek** almost like "Pidgeon English" a new language that they struggled with.

Time of Writing: Scholars dispute the dating of the Gospels be.... So, these are approximate.

Luke: before 70 AD... **before** Matthew's Gospel? ... before Mark who is considered to be the first? John's Gospel was written in 90 AD

Some scholars claim that Luke used both Matthew and Mark as a basis for his text!



• Luke and Mark worked together with St Paul so they would have shared a lot.

Luke would have known Mark's Gospel well:

Philemon 1:23-24: "Epaphras, here in prison with me sends his greetings. So do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas and Luke, all fellow workers for God."

Colossians 4:14: "Luke, the beloved physician sends you greetings....

2Timothy 4:11: "Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is very useful for my ministry."

Some notable characteristics of Luke's Gospel

- (1) His emphasis on the **Humanity** of **Christ** throughout...
 - The Infancy given in detail...
 - The Hidden Life... struggle in the wilderness...
 - The long walking tours on His Mission
 - Jesus' gentleness and compassion for anyone who suffered.
 - Jesus' appreciation of the role of women...

Examples:

- (1) Elizabeth's faith and trust in God contrasted with her husband's lack of faith...
 - 84 year old **Anna** in the Temple most likely one of those taking care of children like BVM: chap 2
 - Simon's mother-in-law: chap 4
 - The Sinful woman: chap 7
 - The Widow of Nain: chap 7
 - Women disciples join Jesus: chap 8
 - Woman with hemorrhage / Jairus' daughter: chap 8
 - Martha and Mary: chap 10
 - The crippled woman: chap 13
 - The Widow's mite: chap 23
 - Women at the Burial of Jesus: chap 23
 - Women at the Resurrection: chap 24

This is <u>unusual</u> for the other Gospels are not peppered with stories about women as much as this.

- (2) **Prayer** is another theme running through this Gospel.
- (3) **Love of Neighbour** is very strong
- (4) The danger of Riches is also very strong.

showing how practical Luke was in applying the teachings of Jesus.

- St Luke is the author of two New Testament works the Gospel and the Acts.
 Modern scholars consider them to be two parts of ONE work.
- He was not only an educated man but also knew the **TORAH** well as is obvious from his writings.
- He is the only author who related both the history of Jesus which was already current in the Church –
 and also the history of the beginnings of the Church, showing that the story of God and His Chosen People
 continued in Jesus and His Mystical Body...
- Like the other Synoptic Gospels Luke is careful to show that all that happened with the Incarnation fulfilled the Scriptures that Jesus is the Glory of Israel.
- As we go through the text I will show you the structure of the Gospel.

For now, the Gospel is divided into two distinct parts:

Part I: The Arrival of the Son of Man: chap $1 \rightarrow 9:50$

Part II: The Departure of the Son of Man: chap 9:50 \rightarrow end

• There are different STAGES to each part:
